The Research, Consultancy and Extension Cell of the College encourages the faculty members to undertake research activities. The cell also publishes biannually 'Tihu College Research Journal'.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

A good number of books were purchased and a few journals were subscribed for library improvement. Teaching aids were purchased. Instruments were purchased for the laboratories.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The faculty members were allowed to attend Refresher Course, Orientation Course and Short-term Course. They participated in the seminars, conferences, workshops etc. The college authority always encourages the faculty members to involve in research activities.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

For faculty and staff recruitment the College follows the rules and regulations of the UGC and Assam Govt. Part-time teachers and temporary staff were appointed by the College authority.

The College is tied up with the North-East Mega Food Park as its partner which ensures employment for the deserving pass outs.

The College admitted the students into various courses on merit basis and selection list was displayed on the notice board prior to the admission. 1. Title of the Practice

Purchase and Installation of Digital Generator
